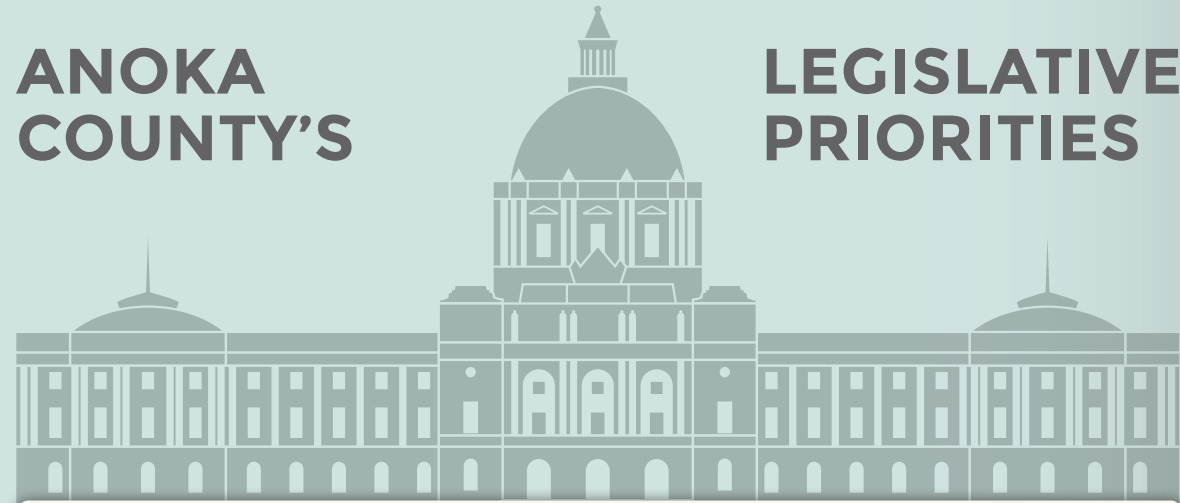

Why They Matter to You

Anoka County's legislative priorities may seem like government housekeeping, but they directly influence the quality of life and level of taxes paid by Anoka County residents. The county and its partners lobby at the state level to obtain funding for important projects, work to secure state support for law changes that improve lives, and advocate against cost shifts that negatively affect county residents.

Results of Successful Lobbying

- Predictable financing for roads and additional funding creates safer interchanges and improved pedestrian trail crossings that result in lower accident rates.
- Fully connected trails allow residents to enjoy safer areas to recreate and commute by non-motorized means.
- Changes at the state could assist in paying for county license centers, resulting in the centers being more self-sustainable.
- County property tax levels are more predictable when it's known how much funding is coming from the state for projects.
- Better public safety services for youth are more likely with legislative support.

"These aren't abstract policy debates — every item on the list connects directly to the county being able to provide services to residents and their daily experience on roads driven, parks enjoyed, taxes paid, and services the county is mandated to provide, which residents rely on," said Scott Schulte, chair, Anoka County Board of Commissioners.

Hwy. 65/Bunker Lake Blvd. Interchange

Highway 65 is a major north-south route in Anoka County.

- Improvements reduce congestion, increase safety, and support economic development — completing this project would ensure the corridor can handle current and future traffic volumes.
- There would be better connectivity between neighborhoods, schools, and businesses.
- If the funding gap isn't closed, residents would face prolonged construction delays and potential property tax increases.

Protect Current Distribution of the Metro-Regional Sales and Use Tax

This funding was established during the 2023 legislative session.



These county funds may be utilized for:

- Active transportation and corridor safety studies.
- Road system repair, preservation, and modernization.
- Transit services, complete streets projects, and greenhouse-gas reduction initiatives.

By safeguarding the current distribution of this tax, Anoka County is securing dependable, locally controlled funding that will enhance county roads, transit options, trails, and community safety—not just today, but for years to come.

Clarifying Responsibility in Juvenile Detention Costs



The county is seeking legislative clarification on who pays for pre-trial juvenile detention when the underlying issue is a delinquency case.

- This is a behind-the-scenes fix with real financial implications for residents and prevents unexpected costs from falling on local taxpayers.
- A solution that clarifies this issue ensures fairness and consistency across counties.
- Taking equitable action would support a stable, predictable juvenile justice system.



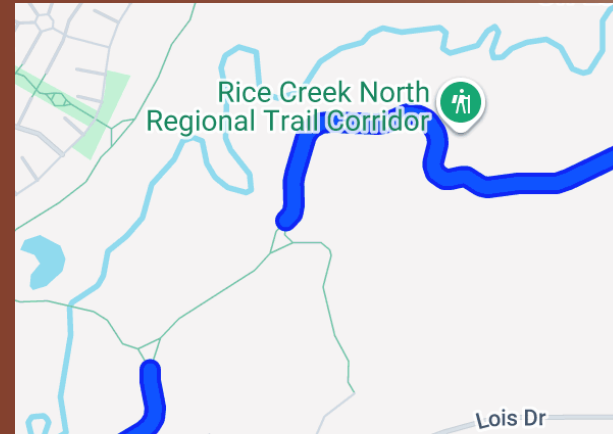

- Property values usually increase near completed trails.



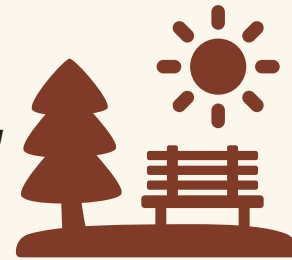

Continued State Support

for Regional Parks

"Anoka County's parks system is one of its greatest assets, but maintaining it requires ongoing state investment," said District 3 Anoka County Commissioner Jeff Reinert. "The county is advocating for continued funding through the Metropolitan Council for operations, maintenance, and capital improvements."

- Cleaner, safer, and better-maintained parks are better for residents and visitors.
- Updated facilities and amenities are an asset for the community.
- There would be more recreational options.



Fair Compensation

for Required Medical Examiner Services

When a primary clinician declines to sign a natural-death certificate, a Medical Examiner must step in and complete this process. The county is seeking authority to charge for this service when necessary.

- This change would reduce costs shifts and create a more sustainable medical examiner's office.



Ensuring Fair Compensation

for License and Passport Centers

"County license centers handle everything from vehicle titles to passports, but state-set filing fees haven't kept pace with rising costs," said District 2 Anoka County Commissioner Julie Braastad. "Meanwhile, state-developed self-service options reduce revenue while increasing the complexity of in-person transactions. This priority is about maintaining convenient, accessible services for the community."

- Equitable reimbursement helps keep local service centers open and staffed.
- Reasonable funding prevents service cuts or closures.
- A solid revenue stream from the state ensures residents don't have to travel as far for basic services.

Protecting Taxpayers

Through Thoughtful Reform of Fiscal Disparities Program



Anoka County is urging that any changes to the regional Fiscal Disparities Program occur only as part of comprehensive property tax reform, not as isolated adjustments. This priority is about safeguarding residents from unintended financial impacts. The term "fiscal disparities" refers to the unequal distribution of taxable resources (like commercial property) among local governments. Minnesota's Fiscal Disparities Program is a creative solution to this issue, where a portion of commercial/industrial property tax growth is pooled across a region and redistributed to ensure all communities in an area can provide adequate public services.

- This change would protect homeowners from sudden tax shifts.
- Reform ensures fairness between communities.
- Improving the program would maintain predictability in the property tax system.

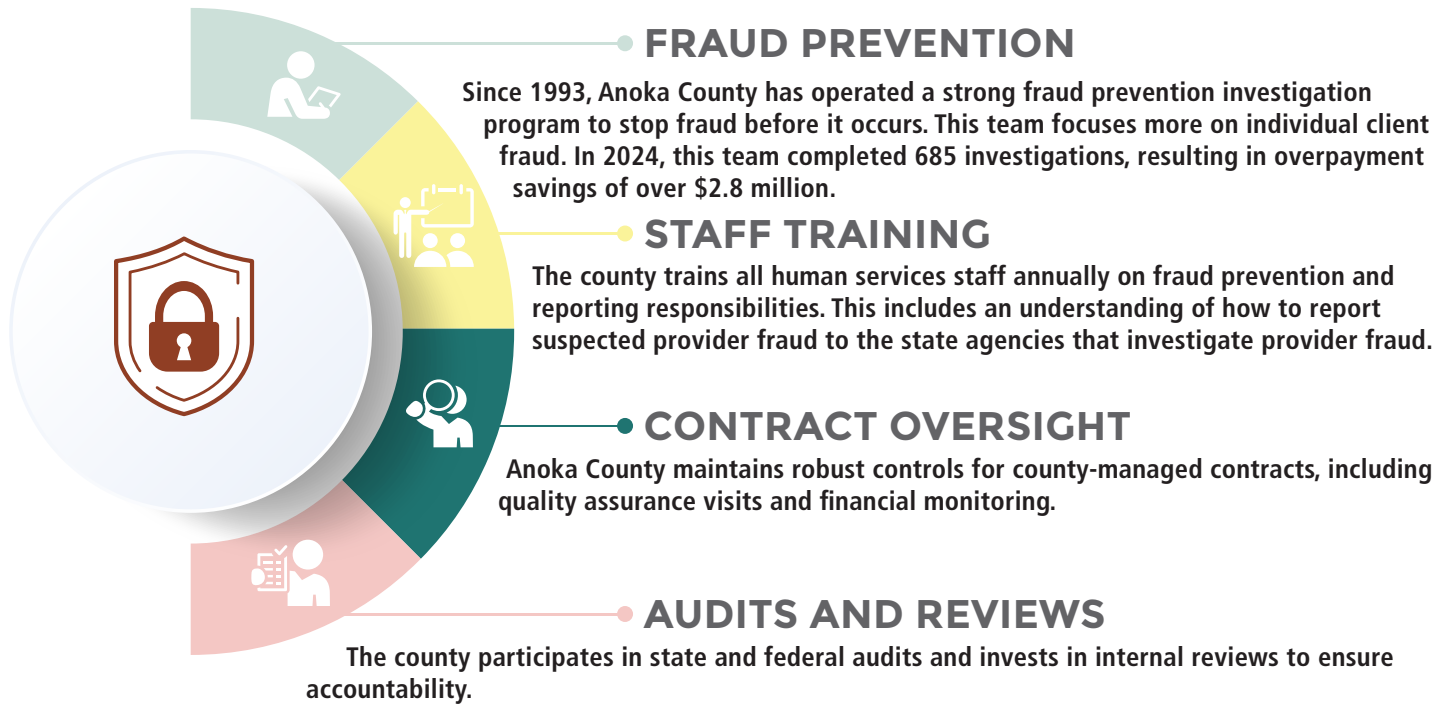

Anoka County Works Diligently to Prevent Fraud

Anoka County is committed to maintaining public trust and upholding its mission of being respectful, innovative, and fiscally responsible. As part of this commitment, the county works diligently to prevent, detect, and address fraud in Minnesota’s public assistance and social services programs.

The Social Services team supports some of the county’s most vulnerable residents, helping them remain in their homes and live productive lives. These programs are a vital safety net, and recent reports of fraud statewide raise concerns about potential impacts on services for seniors and people with disabilities.

While Anoka County does not oversee the contracts or funding that is the source of the recent reports on fraud, the county does play a part in fraud prevention — this role is taken very seriously, and the county is committed to program integrity. This includes:



By prioritizing integrity and accountability, Anoka County helps keep public programs strong, sustainable, and trusted. While it is disheartening to hear about the fraud happening in some of the programs residents use, Anoka County is focused on continuing to deliver high-quality services and helping influence the design of policy and programs to support both access and accountability.

- County Highway 10 – Pleasant Avenue to Able Street.
- 7th Avenue NW – 145th Avenue NW to 1,130 feet north of 165th Avenue.
- Hanson Boulevard at 155th Lane NW – add left turn lanes.

Connexus Energy Provides \$25,000 Donation to Anoka County

In December of 2025, Connexus Energy continued its longtime support of Anoka County by providing a \$25,000 donation in support of the Anoka County Parks Department’s Heritage Lab and Wildlife Outreach Programs.

The Heritage Lab Program engages about 2,500 students annually in hands-on outdoor learning experiences that explore Minnesota’s rich cultural history. The Wildlife Outreach program brings free, in-school presentations to more than 10,000 students each year, introducing them to ten native Minnesota wildlife species and fostering a deeper connection to the natural world. In 2024, 33 schools were visited as part of this program.

Thanks to Connexus’s generous continuing financial support for over 30 years, more than 500,000 students in Anoka County and surrounding communities have reaped the benefits these programs offer. The contributions these programs receive annually from Connexus Energy are instrumental in helping connect youth and families with the natural and cultural heritage of the region.

“For decades, Connexus Energy has been a strong partner in supporting our Parks Department through funding of these important programs,” said District 6 Anoka County Commissioner Julie Jeppson. “These generous donations are

crucial to bringing these experiences to our community’s young people, inspiring them to explore nature through wildlife.”



Connexus has been a longtime supporter of not only the Parks Department but various other Anoka County initiatives. Since 2006, Connexus has donated trash bags for Anoka County’s Adopt-a-Highway Program. In 2018, Connexus approached Anoka County about leasing land to build and maintain a solar garden, demonstrating their commitment to renewable energy. In 2020, Connexus donated funds to help provide 200 activity bags to three food shelves in Anoka County.

Elections Manager Receives Award



Anoka County Elections Manager Tom Hunt recently received the ‘Friend of the League’ Award from the League of Women Voters ABC for his outstanding service in preserving democracy by providing voters safe, secure, and accurate elections.

The Friend of the League Award is given to a community member or group who assists the League of Women Voters ABC in achieving its goal of good government.

“Many League of Women Voters members serve as election judges and appreciate Tom supervising and training judges prior to elections,” District 5 Anoka County Commissioner Mike Gamache said. “Recently, an Anoka County post-election review process took place where it was determined Anoka County had no adjusted differences between machine-tabulated results and hand-counted ballots. Observers also found legal processes set in Minnesota law were followed in Anoka County. Tom’s efforts to protect election integrity are truly top notch and we appreciate all that he does for our county.”

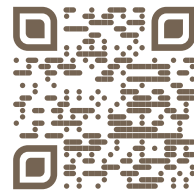

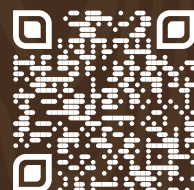

Scroll Smarter
We've got your back with quick tips to help you outsmart clickbait, dodge deception, and scroll like a pro.

Advertisements online may seem like a mild nuisance at most, but don't sell them short. It's important to know how to recognize them in order to avoid ad-related scams. Scammers have been known to pay for advertising that impersonates legitimate websites and businesses. Also, it's possible clicking a sponsored link may infect your device with malware.

Tips

- The first step is to learn how to recognize an ad. Internet searches often place "sponsored results" at the top of the list. Ads are often labeled as such (or with "sponsored," "advertisement," or "paid partnership").
- Instead of clicking on a sponsored result, scroll down to the actual search results and ensure you click on the legitimate website.

Construction Begins this Spring on Highway 65



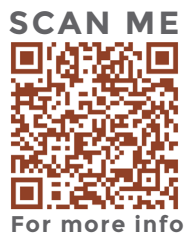
Long-awaited reconstruction of Highway 65 in Blaine is slated to begin this spring between 97th Avenue and 117th Avenue. The four-year project will convert the existing at-grade intersections on Highway 65 at 99th Avenue, 105th Avenue, 109th Avenue, and 117th Avenue/Cloud Drive into interchanges, with Highway 65 traveling above.

The project also includes a pedestrian bridge between 113th Avenue and 114th Avenue and will reroute existing local streets and driveways onto frontage and backage roads between 99th Avenue and 109th Avenue to safely carry local traffic between the interchanges and provide residential and business access. New trails and sidewalks along the highway corridor

will be built to meet Americans with Disabilities (ADA) standards. Improved drainage, including culvert repair/replacements, larger stormwater pipes and vegetation, will help control erosion.

MnDOT will maintain two lanes of traffic in each direction as much as possible, although there will be some single lane traffic and short-term closures and detours on Highway 65. There also will be closures and detours at cross streets. Access will be maintained to all businesses and the community.

When completed in fall 2029, this project will enhance accessibility, reduce congestion, improve traffic flow/travel times and improve safety along the road, and provide a smoother road surface and extend pavement life, with trails constructed along the corridor. Attorney's Office Hires New Chief of Criminal Division



The Anoka County Attorney's Office is pleased to welcome retired Judge Jenny Walker Jasper as the new chief of the office's Criminal Division. Walker Jasper was sworn into her new role by County Attorney Brad Johnson Feb. 9.

"I am grateful that Jenny has joined our office," Johnson said. "She has a breadth and depth of experience and leadership, both as attorney and judge, that few can bring to this role. Her wealth of knowledge and connections have already benefited the important work of our office and the county."

Walker Jasper joins the Anoka County Attorney's Office Criminal Division in the wake of an extraordinarily busy and successful year of high-profile murder trials, all resulting in convictions by juries. In addition to the office's day-to-day felony prosecutions, the Criminal Division recently tried three defendants in a triple murder in Coon Rapids, and each received life sentences without the possibility of parole. In addition, the office's prosecution teams tried three other murder cases, including a domestic-violence murder in Fridley, a 3rd degree murder in Anoka committed by a fentanyl dealer, and the murder of a vulnerable adult by a caretaker in Ramsey — a big lift for any law office.

"I am so excited to join the amazing attorneys and staff at the Anoka County Attorney's Office," Walker Jasper said. "I hope I can bring a helpful perspective to the office and its pursuit of justice for the citizens of Anoka County."

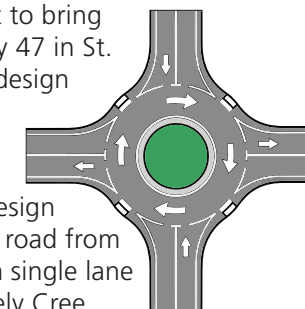

Hwy. 47 project scheduled for 2028

A new road construction project to bring safety improvements to Highway 47 in St. Francis is approaching the final design stage and is scheduled to begin construction in 2028. Specific timing of the project is currently pending based on preliminary design work. The plan is to convert the road from a four-lane divided highway to a single lane each direction from approximately Cree Street to Ambassador Boulevard. Roundabouts at 227th Avenue, Peterson Drive and Ambassador Boulevard will also be included. The project's design was determined through extensive public engagement and feedback in collaboration between MnDOT, Anoka County and the City of St. Francis.



Elections and Voting

Electronic Pollbooks

These devices have been in use in Anoka County polling places since 2018. The decision to use pollbooks has benefited Anoka County residents and provided greater efficiencies for election judges and administrators. It is important to note that at no point in time are the pollbooks ever connected to the voting machines, and the information pollbooks access is securely encrypted.

Reduced Wait Times – Gone are the days of standing in long check-in lines, divided alphabetically by last name, and seeing some lines empty while others take more time because voters in those lines have common last names. Voters can now use any line to check in and, instead of flipping through volumes of paper to find your name, an election judge can now simply do a quick search on the pollbook. Because of these efficiencies, the time you spend in the polling place has been drastically reduced.

Election Integrity – Paper rosters required a manual "Voted" stamp next to the name of every resident who voted absentee. This meant many hours of stamping by election officials, with the potential for mistakes. With pollbooks, this process is done instantaneously, without the possibility of human error. This process is repeated on Election Day as well for any absentee ballots that are received on that day. The ability to update a voter's status in real time allows an election judge to instantly see if the person trying to check in already has a voted ballot.

Voter Privacy – Each page of the paper roster listed the names of multiple residents, which allowed for the possibility of others seeing if you had checked in. The pollbooks only display the information of the person who is currently checking in, thus increasing privacy for every voter.

New Human Services Officer Takes the Helm: Kate Heffernan

Kate Heffernan says the vision of Anoka County's Human Services Division is simple: a community where all people are safe and healthy.

Heffernan joined Anoka County in 2023 as deputy director of the division and is now finding footing in her new role as Chief Human Services Officer.

She began her career at the Minneapolis VA Medical Center conducting dementia research, later moving on to the Wilder Foundation to work in program evaluation. She then spent more than 20 years in human services at Hennepin County, starting as a planner focused on contracts and outcomes in disability programs, then moving on to supervise social workers, managing financial and data teams, and eventually leading economic supports.

No matter what her job title has been, Heffernan's passion has always been helping people.

"I've always been driven to help people— especially those who are vulnerable or marginalized," she said. "Over the years, I've seen how complex our systems can be for both residents and staff and that's fueled my passion for improving the experience of those seeking help."

Human Services staff currently face significant challenges, including funding shifts, complex program rules, and potential service disruptions from Medicaid changes. Anoka County's Human Services team is working to help departments respond through planning, engagement, and leveraging data and policy.

"My focus is on strengthening collaboration, data-driven decision-making, communication, and processes to achieve that," Heffernan said. "I want our whole team to build understanding of how the work across Human Services fits together and how residents see and experience us."

Heffernan is a longtime resident of Minnesota and is married with three kids and a dog. In her free time, she enjoys yoga, reading, and spending time in nature.



Documentary on Opioid Impacts Screened in Anoka

"Faces of Hope," a deeply personal and locally produced documentary featuring the real-life journeys of Anoka County individuals impacted by opioid misuse, was screened to a packed house Feb. 3 at the Lyric Arts Main Street Stage in Anoka.

"This documentary is part of a broader effort to support those affected by opioids," said District 7 Anoka County Commissioner Mandy Meisner. "Faces of Hope has launched a new website, facesofhopeanoka.org, which is a

comprehensive resource hub offering a directory of trusted local support services, free naloxone training and pickup locations across the county, and inspiring stories of resilience, recovery, and hope."

\$350,000 Awarded to Anoka County Job Training Center

The Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED) recently announced more than \$17.3 million for workforce grants that are expected to serve more than 3,500 Minnesotans. The Anoka County Job Training Center in Blaine is being awarded \$350,000 of that funding as part of the Bridge to Career Pathways program, which provides funding for individuals seeking to improve or obtain skills to earn a recognized credential for in-demand industries.

"This funding supports economically disadvantaged adults, providing workforce development and training opportunities that increase career awareness, basic skills, education and training, and more," said District 1 Anoka County Commissioner John Heinrich.



Anoka County Employee Spotlight: Donelle Lawrence

Intrigue is what first led longtime employee Donelle Lawrence to apply for a job with Anoka County.

Forty-five years later, Lawrence has seen it all first as a 911 dispatcher, dispatch supervisor, and in her final role as assistant director of emergency communications.

While Lawrence has spent much of her professional career with the county, she admits the job is certainly not for everyone.

"You have to commit to a 24/7 job, which means working holidays and weekends, working family events, and working overtime," she said. "But if you love it, it gets into your skin."

In the time since Lawrence started to now, many aspects of working for Anoka County have changed. 911 wasn't established until 1982 and staff didn't have computers, so everything was written by hand, and addresses were looked up in a map book. Now, staff look at six computers, have numerous mapping programs and a computer-aided dispatch system, in addition to the help of artificial intelligence (AI).

Department Director of Emergency Communications Kari Morrissey credits Lawrence for always being the person residents and staff can turn to when they need help. Morrissey started working with Lawrence more than 30 years ago in 1992.

"She was one of my trainers who helped me grow and become who I am today," Morrissey said. "I cannot thank her enough for that — for her continued guidance throughout the years and for her friendship along the way."

After more than four decades, Lawrence officially retired from the county Jan. 30.

"It's a reality that I'm having a hard time grasping," Morrissey said. "It's well-earned and we're all happy for her. Donelle is going to be a hard one to replace — the integrity, loyalty, leadership, and knowledge she takes with her will be hard to fill. Our door will always be open for her."

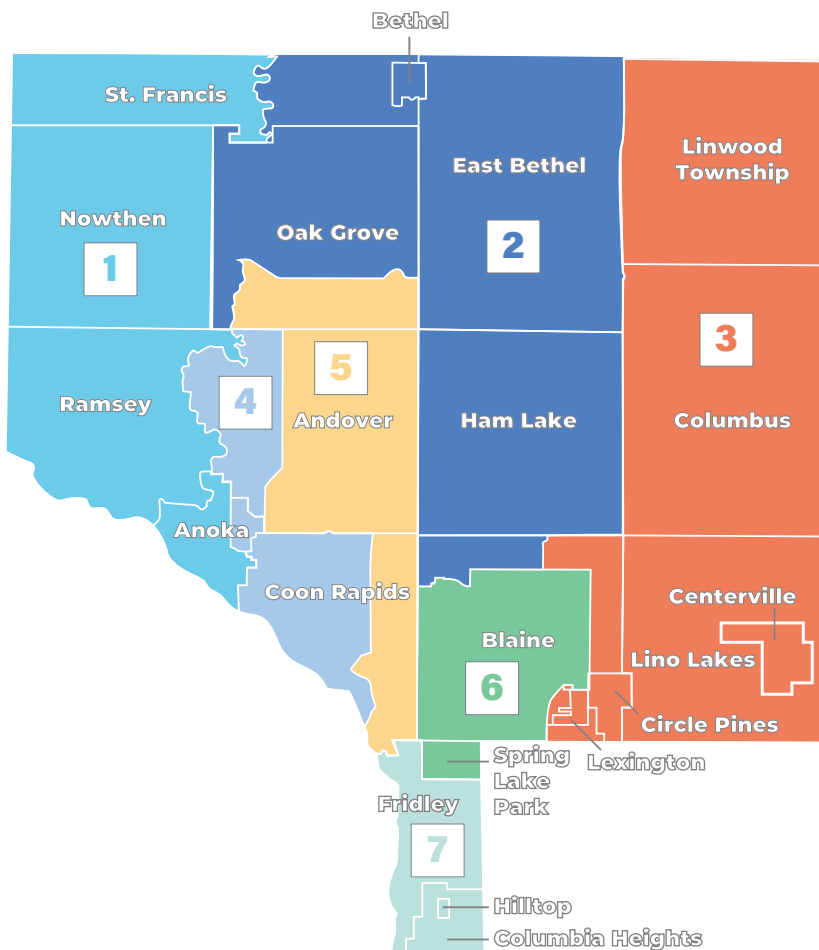
